11+ ENGLISH SUMMER BOOSTER COURSE



Overview

Our Summer Course is aimed at building the key skills needed to achieve top grades in English at 11+. Students will develop their Comprehension, Creative Writing, Reading, Vocabulary and Spelling skills, through inspiring and interactive sessions that get them thinking outside of the box.



What to Expect

Every lesson will have 3-4 key sections, spanning Comprehension, Creative Writing, Reading, Vocabulary and Spelling. The course aims to challenge students applying to the top UK Schools, pushing beyond the National Curriculum level. This is especially important for those applying to the most academic schools and /or scholarships. The course will be geared towards a fun and celebratory 'show day' on the final lesson, where students will show off the various skills they have learnt. This will give the course the necessary element of fun and positivity, while also allowing students to bond and work-together (despite being online), and allowing it to finish with a sense of finality. Logistical Details

All classes will take place online over Zoom. All links will be provided c.1 week before the course commences. Our host will set optional tasks between sessions to ensure students are engaged between classes.







Show Day: Students are invited to show off all our learning. Individual feedback to be provided

Model Lesson Outline

In order to keep the students engaged and keep things moving, every lesson will have 3-4 key sections, spanning the four 'Key Skills': Comprehension, Creative Writing, Reading, and Vocabulary & Spelling. Specific lesson plans will be provided prior to each week, but below is an outline of a model lesson and the essential areas to cover:

Creative Writing Exercise:


- A different key theme will be chosen each lesson, and students will be asked to write on it. Themes may be: descriptive, plotbased/action, comedy, journalism, speechwriting, discussion, picture-based writing.
- Students will be asked to use different techniques and skills (e.g. colours, sounds) and feelings, different literary techniques e.g. metaphor, sensory description, specific vocabulary).
- After 7 weeks, students will be asked to choose their favourite style and to present it at the Show Day.

Book Club Exercise:

- Students will be asked to talk about the book they are reading, what they like about it, and what they think is going to happen next.
- Students will then play a series of offshoot games. For example, with the book 'Diary of a Wimpy Kid'; "Write your own sketch that you'd add to the next book in the series" or "Plan out your own plot for a 'Diary of a Clever Kid' sequel"
- This will be particularly useful for students with school interviews

Comprehension Exercise:

- Students will be asked to hunt through passages of prose and find the literary techniques that are in it. Students will be taught to spot a range of more advanced literary devices and extend their analysis in order to tackle the more complex longer-answer comprehension questions in the most challenging 11+ papers



• Students will then answer a mixture of questions on the comprehension. EG: In the second paragraph, how does the writer create a gloomy atmosphere?

Vocabulary Exercise:

- Every lesson, students will work with a "vocab grid" to extend their vocabulary. This is crucial to enhance comprehension skills and to ensure their creative writing increases in level of complexity
- In-between lessons, parents will be asked to quiz their students once a day on it (takes no more than 2 minutes). This will help keep the course alive in student's minds inbetween classes.

The Final Session: "Show Day"!



The Course Will Be Geared Towards a Celebratory Final "Show Day" on the 8th Lesson


Students will show off the various skills they have learnt. The key areas covered in the course are the same as those tested by the UK's leading independent schools, and are often overlooked in class. The "Show Day" will also be a chance for children to showcase their Speech & Communication skills - another area tested in 11+ interviews for leading schools.

The "Show Day" will involve:

- "Alex Rider or "Book of Dusk" sequel plot.

- A Comprehension Hunt: students will show off the literary techniques they have learnt.

Optional Extension Sessions




Optional Extension Session 1: Analysing and Creating Descriptive Pieces

We will look at some more challenging 11+ comprehension tasks, focusing on analysis of descriptive writing. We will begin to elevate our analysis of descriptive pieces, moving beyond identification and explanation of language features, and starting to think carefully and analytically about how and why features such as metaphor, simile, alliteration, and so on, are powerful in literature. This will lead us into some practice of writing high level descriptive pieces, thinking about how we can weave subtle narratives into highly descriptive pieces, to give responses the shape and sophistication required at the highest levels of the mark scheme.



Optional Extension Session 2: Analysing and Creating Narrative.

Again, we will look at some more challenging comprehension tasks, this time focusing on analysis of narrative construction. We will begin to elevate our analysis of narrative, thinking about how drama, tension, character and theme are created and developed through story-telling. This will lead us into some practice of narrative writing in the style of the questions typically found in the 11+ exam. We will work on creating unique pieces that stand out from the crowd, as well as on ensuring that the level of language used is as complex and impressive as that required for a more obviously descriptive task.


Optional Extension Session 3: Analysing and Writing Non-Fiction


In this session we will perfect the approach needed when tackling a non-fiction comprehension. This will help us to understand the features, tone, style and form of various different types of non-fiction writing, thereby preparing the students to create their own non-fiction pieces which thoroughly satisfy the requirements of the 11+ exam.



Optional Extension Session 4: Analysing Poetry and Poetic Language

In this final session we will turn to poetry analysis. We will practice some analysis of poetry, both to prepare for the (relatively small) eventuality that students are presented with a poem to analyse, but most importantly to enhance their analytical skills, since poetic language is employed throughout literature - both fiction and non-fiction - to powerful effect.





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
